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EDITORIAL

CONSTANT VARIETIES OF THE 1868 ISSUE OF CANADA

The fourth article in a series by Horace W. Harrison
B.P.S., B.N.A.P.S., R.P.S.C., C.P.S., of G.B.

The 6c Value—Approximately 100,000 Plate Impressions from 2 Plates

Plate 1.—Approximately 55,000 Plate Impressions

Stamps from this plate can be recognised by the location of a position dot in the lower left corner beneath the spandrel and very slightly to the right of the left margin of the design on all stamps on the plate except those from the first vertical row. Stamps from this plate in the first vertical row have no position dot whatever at the lower left.

The steel in this plate was of very poor quality and wore rather rapidly so that worn impressions, especially apparent in the outer scroll-work, are characteristic.

From a study of 156 dated copies of this value, it seems apparent that Plate I was withdrawn from use in the spring of 1869 but was brought back into service in the late summer or early fall of 1870 at which time both plates were used to fill the orders for this value.

Re-entries on Plate 1.

The early work on the re-entries on Plate I was done by Brigadier Studd and Mr. R. W. T. Lees-Jones. Their findings were evidently reported in the British philatelic press, but nothing has come to my attention on the subject in the Canadian or U.S. publications other than one small reference in Vol. 9, No. 5 of the Canadian Philatelist, part of a comprehensive article on the Large Queen Issue by Mr. R. C. Martin.

There are at least 24 plate positions which were re-entered on Plate I, and it is surmised that most, if not all, of these re-enterings took place very early in the life of the plate, some as early as May of 1868.

Figure 1: A major re-entry showing doubling in "CANADA PO" and "SIX CE". There is no position dot at the lower left indicating that this position is in the first vertical row of the plate.

Figure 2: A dot in the upper right margin, probably caused by some extremely hard foreign matter loose on the plate when the transfer roll was impressed at this position; as it not only made a dot but also impressed an indentation in the frame line beneath the dot. A similar dot with loop beneath it is also found in the upper left scroll $2\frac{1}{2}$ mm. below the top of the scroll. This variety has been noted in a horizontal strip of four, being the second stamp from the left; and the fourth stamp in the strip has the re-entry illustrated in Figure 4.

Figure 2A: Probably through plate wear the loops under the dots disappeared, but the dots remained. This position was re-entered and clearly shows doubling of the circular frame line over "A POS". "Counters" in the upper margin plus the regular position dot at lower left indicate the position of this variety and re-entry as either No. 2 or No. 3.

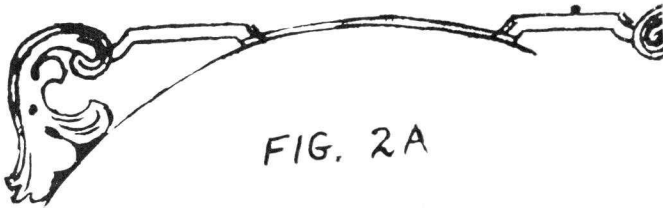

Figure 3: At position No. 3 or No. 2, whichever the above variety is **not**, there occurs a re-entry in which the top of the upper right scroll shows a faint extra line; the loop of the "P" of Postage is severely foreshortened at its bottom; and the upper left scroll is either very badly worn or very poorly transferred. "Counters" in the top margin.

Figure 4: Re-entered in both horizontal upper frame lines and both upper scrolls. This has been noted with sufficiently large upper margin to establish it as in the 1st horizontal row and has been noted in a horizontal strip of four, the right end stamp, the second stamp from the left being the variety illustrated in Fig. 2. Position No. 4 or No. 5.

Figure 5: At position No. 6 on late printings, at least, there occurs a plate flaw consisting of a dot in the upper left margin over the point where the horizontal frame line falls away to meet the left scroll. This has been noted with Imprint, Boggs Type IV, in the yellow brown shade.

Figure 6: At position No. 94 the upper right scroll ornament has a clear line around most of its exterior; the upper left scroll ornament has an extra line at the top; and there is a faint extra line showing above the upper right outer frame line over "TA" of Postage.

Figure 7: At position No. 95 the upper right scroll ornament has a clear line around all of its exterior; the upper left scroll ornament has an extra line at the top; there is a faint trace of an extra line above the outer frame over "N" of Canada; and there is a quite definite extra line above the inner frame over the second "A" of Canada.

At position No. 96 there is no indication of re-entering, even on stamps in the yellow brown shade of the last printings. Note, however, that this position carries the Imprint which Boggs designates as Type IV. According to his 2 Volume work on Canada published in 1944, Plate I carried the Imprint which he designated as Type III and Plate II carried the Type IV Imprint. Dismissing the unlikely possibility that the Imprints on the Plate were changed during its period of desuetude, it is apparent that both Plates I and II carried the Type IV Imprint.

Figure 9: At position No. 42 or No. 43 (estimated from observing two copies, one wmkd. "L" reversed and the other wmkd. "LL" (reversed), the outer circle over "POS" has a clear extra line, and there are three lines where the horiz. frame line falls away to meet the right scroll.

Figure 10: At position No. 45 or No. 55 (also estimated from observing wmkd. copies), there is a faint extra line over the left scroll; a clear extra line over the outer half of the right scroll; a faint extra line in the margin beneath both the "S" of Six and of Cents; and the "OS" of Postage is severely foreshortened.

Figure 11: A re-entry occurs at Position unknown similar to that illustrated in Figure 10 at the bottom of the stamp, but with extra lines found in the scroll to the left of the value tablet. At the top the outer frame line over "NAD" has a clear extra line; there is a faint extra line over the circular frame above "A POS"; the upper right scroll has a complete extra line; and the "S" of Postage shows clear extra lines at its center and top.

Figure 12: A re-entry occurs at Position unknown similar to that illustrated in Figure 11, except that the extra line over the outer circle

above "A POS" is quite clear. At the bottom, however, there are faint extra lines in the scroll to the right of the value panel; under the "S" of Six the inner frame line is broken; and there is an extra line which terminates under the "X". As in Figures 10 and 11, there is an extra line under the "S" of Cents.

Figure 13: A re-entry occurs at Position unknown in which there is a faint extra line above the outer frame line over "NAD", and there is a clear extra line where the horizontal frame line falls away to join the left scroll.

Figure 14: A re-entry occurs at Position unknown in which there is a faint extra line above the circular outer frame at the top from "A" of Postage across to and including the right scroll.

Figure 15: A re-entry occurs at Position unknown in which there is an extra line above the horizontal frame over "TA" of Postage, and where the horizontal frame line falls away to join the right scroll.

Figure 16: At Position No. 41 there are 3 inner lines on the right side of the vignette instead of the normal 2; there are faint extra lines above the upper left scroll and the horiz. frame line; and there is a small vertical dash in the upper horizontal arm of the "E" of Postage. No position dot at lower left. Imprint Type IV at left.

Figure 17: In the first vertical row at Position unknown there are three inner frame lines on the right side of the vignette; and there are clear traces of re-entering in "TAGE" of Postage.

Figure 18: In the first vertical row at Position unknown, the three inner vignette frame lines begin under the "E" of Postage; there is a small vertical dash in the upper horizontal arm of "E"; but no trace of re-entering above the upper left scroll and frame line as found at Position No. 41. No position dot at lower left.

Figure 19: In the first vertical row at Position unknown, there is an extra line at the upper right where the horizontal frame line falls away to join the right scroll; and there are extra lines in the lower scroll to the left of the value panel. No position dot at lower left.

Figure 20: In the first vertical row at Position unknown, the 3 inner vignette frame lines begin to the left of the spandrel below the "E" of Postage. No position dot at lower left.

Figure 21: In the tenth vertical row at Position unknown (but not No. 50 or No. 60), the 3 inner vignette frame lines begin to the left of the spandrel below the "E" of Postage. Normal position dot at lower left.

Figure 22: A re-entry occurs at Position unknown in which the 3 inner vignette frame lines show only in the lower right quadrant, and on cleanly printed copies there are 4 lines showing. Normal position dot at lower left.

Figure 23: A re-entry occurs at Position unknown in which the 3 inner vignette frame lines begin to the left of the spandrel below the "E" of Postage; there is an extra line at the upper right between the horizontal frame and the scroll which also shows a faint extra line at the right. Normal position dot at the lower left.

Figure 24: A re-entry occurs at Position unknown (not in the first horizontal or vertical rows), in which the 3 inner vignette frame lines

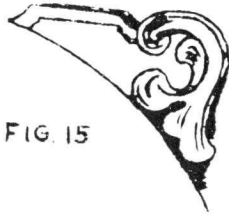

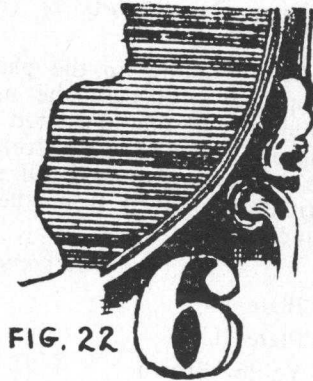

show only at the top under "DA POST" of Canada Postage. Normal position dot at lower left.

Figure 25: In the second vertical row at Position unknown, the horizontal frame line at the upper right is faintly doubled and there is a dot in the upper margin centered over the "P" of Postage.

Figure 26: This illustrates a flaw in the "S" of Six, found on a copy on thinner horizontal wove paper in the black brown shade. It has not yet been confirmed as constant and reports of confirming copies would be appreciated.

Figure 27: This illustrates a dot in the "E" of Cents. This dot has been reported on a light yellow brown copy having the re-entry illustrated by Figure 21. Reports of confirming copies of this dot would be appreciated.

Before taking up the plate varieties found on Plate II, it seems appropriate to discuss the usage of the two plates as disclosed by examination of the 156 dated copies mentioned previously and another group of 174 copies, a relatively unpicked wholesale stock many of which were faulty or damaged. Of these two groups, it is believed that the information derived from the unpicked wholesale stock is the more significant.

From these figures, it can be concluded that slightly more than half the total deliveries for the 6c value were printed on Plate I, but that when this plate was placed back in service in the late summer or early fall of 1870 it was used less than Plate II. It is also apparent that slightly less than half the total issue was in the yellow brown shade of the later printings, but the use of the circular date stamp as an obliterator had fallen off considerably from the earlier period.

It has been reported elsewhere that copies of Plate II are known dated in May of 1869. In the dated group examined for this study, two are dated in June and one in July of 1869 and all three are printed on the soft white absorbent paper sometimes referred to as "blotting" paper. In fact, Plate II on ordinary horizontal wove paper does not make its appearance in this group until December 31, 1869, and this and subsequent copies are in the light brown shade characteristic of Plate II emissions up until the fall of 1870 when the yellow brown shade begins to show up in quantity. The first distinctly yellow brown shade appears in June of 1870, but its appearance is sporadic and only from the larger cities until February of 1871 when it becomes the overwhelmingly predominant shade through July of 1872, by which time the 6c Small Queen had supplanted it. It is perhaps worth noting that of 39 dated

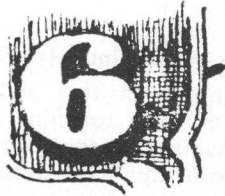

copies in the distinctive light brown shade, but 6 or 15% are from Plate I, the earliest dated being September 1870. It is considered that the most difficult 6c varieties to obtain are the Plate I soft white absorbent paper, and Plate I in the light brown shade. It is perhaps a fortunate thing that, so far, not very many collectors have been looking for them.

Plate 11—Approximately 45,000 Plate Impressions

Stamps from this plate can be recognised by the location of a position dot just touching the outer frame line beneath the "S" of Six on all stamps on the plate except those from the first vertical row. Stamps from this plate in the first vertical row have a very faint position dot in the outer left margin about $\frac{1}{2}$ mm. beyond the left vertical edge of the design, and about $\frac{1}{4}$ mm. below the bottom horizontal edge. Traces of a horizontal guide line running from the dot to the right as far as the "X" of Six are quite characteristic of these positions.

Placed in use in the spring of 1869, this plate gave excellent impressions during its entire usage until this value was supplanted by the issuance of the 6c value of the Small Queen series in January of 1872. No re-entries from this plate have been reported to date, as far as this author knows. However, there are a number of plate flaws which have been confirmed as constant and are of considerable interest in that their positions in the plate have not yet been established.

Flaws on Plate 11

Figure 1: A plate flaw, possibly a graver's slip, occurs above the "P" of Postage extending into the upper margin.

Figure 2: A plate flaw occurs in the right margin just touching the outer frame line opposite the value numeral "6". A horizontal pair has been observed in which the left stamp has the flaw illustrated in Fig. 1 and the right stamp has the flaw illustrated in Fig. 2.

Figure 3: A plate flaw, possibly a graver's slip, occurs in the "D" of Canada, extending up into the ornamental work above.

Figure 4: A plate flaw, possibly a graver's slip, occurs in the "I" of Six, extending down into the lower margin where another similar flaw can be found on copies with a large bottom margin. A horizontal pair on cover has been observed in which this flaw occurs on the left stamp, and the flaw illustrated in Fig. 3 occurs on the right stamp.

Figure 5: A plate flaw occurs in the vertical margin opposite the "E" of Postage and the spandrel below it.

Figure 6: A plate flaw, similar in appearance to a position dot, occurs in the left margin of the first vertical row approximately 1mm. above the faint position dot. Position No. 1 has been eliminated as a possible location for this flaw.

Figure 7: A plate flaw, similar in appearance to a position dot, occurs in the upper margin over the right spandrel about 2mm. in from the right vertical edge of the design. The tenth vertical row has been eliminated as a possible location for this flaw.

Then the "staff" at the auction itself: Sid Rutter and Jim Woods who together marshalled the lots and handed them out to the room buyers, and Hedley Hollands who came all the way from Canada and got lumbered with the job of clerking the sale at literally a moments notice . . . without them chaos would have reigned between 5.30 and 6 p.m. Finally, thanks to those who made the sale possible at all. I mean, of course, all those who provided the lots—without them it wouldn't have much use at all, would it?

This year in response to a number of requests the list of prices realised is being printed. Maybe it will encourage a good supply of lots next year! Any lot not listed was unsold, either because it didn't get a bid or because the owner's reserve wasn't reached, so please don't write to me to enquire why you didn't get an apparent unsold! Tie bids were given to the first bid received.

NEWFOUNDLAND CORNER

by Dr. R. Willan

The 10c black brigantine of 1887 is remarkable among the stamps of Newfoundland in two respects. Firstly, the plate is of 50 subjects, 10 rows of 5, with the imprint of the British-American Bank Note Co., Montreal, in the top and bottom margins only, opposite stamps No. 3 and 48. Secondly, it has an extraordinary number of guide lines and dots. The plate before the laying down of the roller impressions must have been covered with guide markings, and though some slight cleaning was carried out, a large proportion of these remain, and no stamp is without a trace of them. It is difficult to see what useful purpose was served by this unusual complexity, but a classified list of the markings may be useful to students.

Vertical lines

A vertical line ran the length of the plate down the centre of each vertical row of stamps. When present it is most easily seen at the top and bottom of the stamp and in the margins between. In the first two vertical rows I find it in the lower half of the sheet, but not the upper half except on stamp No. 12. In the third row it appears on all stamps except No. 8. In the fourth vertical row I have not found it on Nos. 19, 24 and 29, but in the fifth row it is on all except No. 25. It is doubled on Nos. 32 and 37, and on Nos. 39 and 44—two vertical pairs.

Horizontal lines

These run the width of the plate. In the sixth, ninth and tenth horizontal rows they are through the top of the stamps at the level where the top corner ornaments meet the frame above NEWFOUNDLAND. In row 10 this line is faint and broken.

In rows 1, 2, 3 and 4, the horizontal guide lines are at the bottom of the stamps. In rows 1 and 2 it coincides with the bottom frame line, so is only visible to the right and left of the designs, through the margins between stamps. In row 3 it is doubled, one line coinciding with the frame line and the other just above it, in the white line between the value label and frame. In row 4 it is just below the frame line.

Row 5 has a horizontal line in the bottom margins, $\frac{3}{4}$ mm. below the frame lines. There is a dot on this line opposite the centre of each stamp. Rows 7 and 8 have no horizontal guide lines.

Arcs

The best known of these are on the nine upper stamps of the third vertical row, cut at their highest or lowest points by the central vertical guide line. In No. 3 the top of the arc is 1mm. below the bottom frame line. In Nos. 8 and 13 it is in the white line between value label and frame, and in the other six it cuts through the CE of CENTS, forming the so-called "hairline" varieties. In the upper five stamps the convexity is upwards, in the lower four downwards. No. 48 does not show an arc.

In addition to these, No. 18 has an arc at the top, convexity down, its ends at the tips of the corner ornaments and its centre masked by the upper edge of the name label. No. 23 has an arc convexity upwards, $\frac{3}{4}$ mm. above the top frame over UND. This is the top of a circle, radius 21mm, whose centre is the dot on the horizontal guide line below the same stamp, and whose lowest part forms the hairline on No. 28. This is the only instance where I have been able definitely to associate two arcs.

At the lower left corner of No. 11 is an arc, convexity down, mainly in the sheet margin. Its lowest point is level with the bottom frame, $2\frac{1}{4}$ mm. outside the left corner. The right portion of this arc cuts into the stamp, forming a hairline through the corner ornament and the T of TEN. At the opposite end of this row a precisely similar arc occurs in the sheet margin beside No. 15. The left part of this arc forms a hairline through the corner ornament.

A few stamps show more or less horizontal lines through the middle letters of NEWFOUNDLAND, but I have not yet satisfied myself whether these are portions of arcs or not.

Dots were previously mentioned on the horizontal guide line below the fifth row of stamps. They also occur at the bottom of some of the arcs and occasionally on guide lines about 1mm. to the left of the lower left corner of stamps. A few do not seem to be related to the preparatory lines. The position dots used for the side point on the roller arm in laying down the impressions are rather larger and appear on a number of the stamps. They show either in the head of the second N of NEWFOUNDLAND or in the white line inside the top frame line. When this dot does not show it is because it falls in the coloured strip along the top of the name label, except in the top row, which has no dots, but they occur in the bottom sheet margin. In all cases they are exactly $3\frac{1}{2}$ mm. below the lower frame of the stamp above them.

The only good re-entry I have noticed is in the upper right portion of No. 3.
